There are many expressions with the verbs **come** and **go**:

My monthly food bill comes to about £350.

The kids always **come** first.

Most of my money goes on bills.

How did your interview go?

That tie **goes** really well with your jacket.

GO usually implies a change of state. So do **GET** and **BECOME**:

Don't worry. You'll soon **get** used to working such long hours.

(Compare: I am used to working long hours. I've done it for years.)

The can use GET + ADJECTIVE (or past participle) to describe a sudden change of state or

GET + TO-INFININTIVE to talk about a gradual change.

They **got married** last week.

I'm sure the kids will **get to like** each other.

BECOME is more formal than GET and it can't be used with to-infinitives. But you can use BECOME with nouns:

He **became a millionaire** at 40.
